Where the Discerning Chef, the magazine where Ray and Simone work has been a very big legacy name in, magazine publishing in this world for a very long time, and their image is getting old and stale, and they bring on this guy Chase, to try to refresh the image, bring the Discerning Chef into the digital age, and all of the sudden, instead of being able to, like, meticulously test recipes and make sure that they're able to, like, produce high quality products, for to their readers, the test kitchen team is suddenly told no, you need to make things that are viral that will, you know, go viral on TikTok or that, you know, everyone's doing kale right now. So I need 15 different kale recipes. And it doesn't matter that kale isn't in season right now. And there is very clear tension between wanting your workplace to continue so you can do what you love and wanting to do work that you can be proud of. And a big part of doing work that you can be proud of is being able to be yourself while you are doing your job. I mentioned earlier that Ray is non-binary, and that actually ends up becoming a major plot point in the story because they are on the receiving end of a lot of transphobia at in their workplace. They are not being called the correct pronouns, they are not being addressed by their preferred name, by a lot of the higher ups at their workplace, and it causes them immense distress to the point where they would love to be able to leave their job. But they can't, because this job is the only way that they will have health insurance. That would cover top surgery, which is a gender affirming surgery that has been proven to be life saving care.

She attempted to, like, be nice to her trans roommate, but ended up asking these kind of clumsy questions and ended up working out a deal with the room with Luna to be like, hey, ended up working out a deal with Luna because Luna mentioned that doing all of this kind of emotional labor and educating is taxing on trans people. And I'm going to say, for queer people everywhere to constantly be explaining your identity. Simone and Luna work out a deal where every time Simon wants to ask Luna a trans question, Luna gets compensated with food. And so it'll be like, all right, this question about how to, you know, affirm this person that you very clearly have a crush on but are not willing to actually admit it. This is going to be at least a one tray of brownie questions, or one tray of brownies question. And I thought that that was also a really wonderful portrayal of just how of how queer people absolutely down to talk about their experiences, their identities. But make sure that they feel appreciated.

And I think not just me, but I think a lot of people right now can definitely relate to. Why haven't you moved out? Yeah. Like, you want to buy a house for me? And I think with Tam, I definitely relate to, their conflict with previous adults in their lives that they thought that they could trust. And it turns out they couldn't, including an old teacher that was kind of their main teacher that they were out to and talked about problems at home with and then that and it just it felt really nice to see that and the effects of it. As Tam after that betrayal has trust issues even towards Nova, even though they know that they can trust her. And it just it's just it's nice to see and then be able to go through that and be able to come out on the other side with their loved ones there to support them. I just I loved that whole thing and I love them both so much. But I do think my favorite characters were definitely the nanas. The two very much Uncle Iroh characters, the cool, mentors that are there to support their kids but will still put up a fight even if they're a bit older. They very much - they kind of reminded me of Velma and Daphne with their designs. I was like, This is Velma and Daphne when they get older. Yeah, very much so.
